Annexation: How Democracy and Xenophobia Ended U.S. Territorial Expansion (under review)

Abstract: Why did the United States stop annexing territory? In brief, I argue that leaders reject annexation where they fear its domestic political and normative consequences, and that as a result democratic leaders tend to reject the absorption of alien societies. I test my theory using twenty-three case studies process tracing the decision making of U.S. leaders facing opportunities for annexation between 1774 and 1898. U.S. leaders’ fears of the domestic costs of annexation regularly drove them to reject even profitable opportunities for annexation, a finding with significant implications for our understanding of U.S. foreign policy and international relations.
